Wishing everyone the very best always.



A "New" Beginning

The much-coveted Gandhi Alumni AHA International Training Centre was inaugurated in December of 2016. It has seen a very active role in 2016 with 150 candidates being trained and certified as providers and 18 as Instructors in BLS and ACLS as per AHA protocols. And in 2017 we conducted 5 such programs wherein 96 Candidates were trained as providers.

The year of 2018 has brought in a new beginning, as the ITC has introduced the **community CPR** and also the **pediatric advanced life support programs (PALS)**. The year of 2018 started with a program of BLS and ACLS in which 39 were trained to be providers and 10 were trained as instructors. On the 9th and 10th of January, we saw a roaring response to the community CPR program, inaugurated by Mr. Nayani Narsimha Reddy, The Hon'ble Home Minister to The State of Telangana, with 3217 people being trained in hands-only CPR and AED education. The trainees included people from all walks of life such as the members of police, NCC cadets, high school, nursing, and medical students, hospital house-keeping staff and general public. They were trained by an international team of instructors from the U.S. and India. This program was very well organized by GMCAA leadership Dr.B. Pratap Reddy and his team, in collaboration with numerous local NGOs including Sevabharathi (Mr.Narasimha Murthy), You see foundation (Mr.Gunaranjan), and The Rotary club of Bhagyanagar, who were instrumental in providing 75 volunteers, who gave invaluable service.

Later, the team also held a session of training in PALS, wherein 10 providers were trained to be instructors and another 16 candidates were trained as providers in the latest protocols of pediatric life support.

The international training team included Dr.Ravinder R. Surakanti; Dennis McCauly EMT-P; Darrell Clase EMS Director, Lafayette,IN; Dr. Vemuri S. Murthy, Advisor ; Dr.Rajender Gattu, Dr. Rajshekar Kollipara; Dr. Dwarak Vemuri from the U.S. and Dr.P.Maheshwar Reddy (Director and coordinator AHA programs at ITC) and his dedicated team of instructors including Dr.Vijay Kumar Rao, Dr. Bhasker Reddy, Dr. Saif Patel, Dr. Mohib Hussain, Dr. Gopinath Deshi, Dr. Sonali Ramakrishna, Dr.Nagarjuna Chakravarthy from India. We have also designated 10 AED's donated by Drs. Manchikanti, Dwarak, Surakanti, Rajshekar, Murthy Vemuri, and Sudhaker, to be installed at various public places in the city.

We thank all the people involved in making such a massive undertaking a huge success.
